Gandhi and the Ethics and Practice of Journalism: the Experience with Indian Opinion in South Africa

This talk will focus on Gandhi's engagement with the media and his decision to establish a newspaper in South Africa in 1903. He argued that Indian opinion in many ways reflected the transformations in his life. The talk will focus on Gandhi's recognition of the power of the press, the changes that the newspaper and its production processes underwent and certain key principles of journalism that Gandhi developed out of this experience.
