A. Composition of the Senate

- 1) For the purposes of the Faculty Senate, the Faculty is defined as: Teaching Professors, Assistant Professors, Associate Professors, Professors, Chancellor Professors, Assistant Librarians, Associate Librarians, Librarians, Clinical Assistant Professors, Clinical Associate Professors, Clinical Professors, and Professional Technicians who are associated with a particular department. Members of the faculty are eligible to serve on the Senate and its committees and to vote in elections to those positions.
- 2) All Senators will be elected for three-year (3) terms, except when elected to fill unexpired terms.

 The candidates receiving the largest plurality will be elected.
 - 3) In the event that an election does not result in filling the vacancies, the President of the Faculty Senate, with the advice and consent of the Steering Committee, will appoint members from eligible faculty. In the event an incumbent Senator must vacate their seat between May 1 and November 30, a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held in December, and when they must vacate their seat between December 1 and April 30 a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held concurrent with the next regular election.
 - 4) In cases where an individual elected as a Senator or committee member takes a sabbatical leave or other temporary leave, the President of the Senate, with the advice and consent of the Steering Committee, shall appoint an interim member during the time of their leave, and the elected individual will resume that seat upon their return, so long as the date of their return remains within their initial term of office. In cases where an individual elected as a Senate Officer takes a sabbatical leave or other temporary leave, their seat shall be vacated and filled in accordance with the provisions in E.3.j.
 - 5) Members will begin serving their terms at the last regularly scheduled meeting of the academic year of their election.
 - 6) The Senate will consist of eighty (80) voting members as follows:
 - a) Forty (40) designated representatives apportioned to the following Senate Councils by the "Huntington-Hill Method" formally described in A.6(a)xii:
 - i. Engineering Senate Council
 - ii. Visual and Performing Arts Senate Council
 - iii. Humanities Senate Council

9	xi.	Professional technicians shall be members of the Council for the department
10		with which they are associated.
11	xii.	Each Council is allocated one seat by default. The remaining seats are allocated
12		one at a time to the Councils, with each subsequent seat allocated to the
13		Council with the largest priority number. The priority number, recalculated after
14		each seat is allocated, is the ratio of the number of full-time faculty in the
15		Council to the geometric mean of the number of seats it has already been
16		allocated and the number it would hold if it were allocated an additional seat.
17	xiii.	These designated seats shall be reapportioned following the method described
18		in A.6(a).xii every six academic years based on full-time faculty numbers at the
19		start of the Fall semester of the reapportionment year, such that the new
20		apportionment shall be in place for the subsequent Spring election. The
21		academic year in which the reapportionment is calculated and implemented in
22		the Spring election shall be termed the "reapportionment year."
23	xiv.	If a Council gains a seat in reapportionment, that seat shall provide a term
24		coincident with the term of the seat that was lost, which may be a partial term,
25		so as to preserve the number of designated seats allocated to each Cohort in
26		E.1.a. The lost-and-gained seat shall be a seat granting a full three-year term if
27		possible and, if no such seat is available, the seat with the longest term to be
28		filled at the election. If more than one seat is lost by one Council and gained by
29		another, random selection shall be used to determine which lost seat shall be
30		associated with each gained seat. If the gained seat is allocated to Cohort with a
31		partial term remaining, it will be filled for the remainder of the term by special
32		election.

1					xv. If a Council loses a seat in reapportionment and following the procedures in
2					6.a.xiv, the lost seat is in a Council with years remaining in the term, the
3					following procedure shall be used: from among those Senators elected to a
4					designated seat in that Council who shall have the fewest remaining years left in
5					their term after he reapportionment year, a random selection shall determine
6					which individual Senator will be associated with the lost seat, unless there is
7					only one such Senator, in which case they will be associated with the lost seat.
8					That individual Senator shall serve the remainder of their term as an at-large
9					Senator, their seat reducing by one the number of available at-large seats in the
10					election taking place at the end of the reapportionment year. At the expiration
11					of their term, their at-large seat shall be vacated and filled by election for a term
12					lasting until such time as that seat is up for its regular Cohort election. At no
13					time may the total number of elected Senators exceed 80.
14				b)	Five (5) persons who are Part-Time Lecturers from any Senate Council, no more than
15					three (3) from the same Senate Council. Part-Time Lecturers shall be eligible to vote in
16					the election of the seats designated to Part-Time Lectures.
17				c)	Thirty-five (35) members-at-large elected from the full-time members of the faculty.

30		2)	The	dut	ties of the Secretary will be:

a) To keep the official rolls of the membership of the Senate.

b) To prepare and publish minutes of all Senate meetings.

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1		c)	To act as a liaison between the Senate President/Steering Committee and all Senate
2		·	Committees, which includes receiving reports from all Committees of the Senate to be
3			filed as part of the permanent records of the Senate, reviewing committee charges, and
4			assisting with scheduling and facilitating committee meetings as needed.
5		d)	To perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the By-laws or by the Steering

7	3)	The Ste	eering Committee will be composed of the President and nine (9) members apportioned
8		to the	Senate Councils, defined in A. 1) a), as follows:

l1		c)	One (1) from the Natural Science Senate Council

19	4)	The Ste	eering Committee will meet regularly at least once a month during the academic year and
20		at the	call of the President. On petition of any three (3) of its members, the President must call a
21		Steerin	ng Committee meeting within five (5) working days. The duties of the Steering Committee
22		will be	:
23		a)	To prepare the agenda for regular meetings of the Senate.
24		b)	To submit to the President of the Senate for consideration a list of nominees for
25			membership on Senate Standing Committees except for those Committees for which
26			the By-laws provide for an alternate method of selection.
27		c)	To create all ad-hoc Senate Committees. Any member of the faculty may be appointed
28			to these Committees.
29		d)	To serve as the Faculty Senate's primary channel of communication with the Provost
30			and Chancellor.

1		e)	To elect from its faculty ranks, at the first meeting of the Steering Committee, a
2			President Pro-Tempore to serve in place of the President for a period of now more than
3			six weeks.
4	5)	The Re	presentative to the Board of Trustees will be elected annually by the members of the
5		Senate	from its membership. The duties of the Representative to the Board of Trustees will be:
6		a)	To serve as a liaison between the Senate and the Board of Trustees.
7		b)	To report to the Senate on matters of interest from the Board of Trustees meeting at
8			the Senate meeting following the Board of Trustees meeting.
9	6)	The As	sociate Representative to the Board of Trustees will be selected by re-running the ranked-
10		choice	results for the Representative to the Board of Trustees, excluding the individual who was
11		elected	to the primary position. Duties will be to assist the Representative to the Board of
12		Trustee	es in serving as a liaison between the Senate and the Board of Trustees.
13	7)	The Fa	culty Senate President, Representative to the Board of Trustees, and Associate
14		Repres	entative to the Board of Trustees will be members on the University of Massachusetts
15		System	Intercampus Faculty Council.
16	8)	Parlian	nentarian: The role of the Parliamentarian is to be a non-voting Senator and resource to
17		the Pre	esident and body and to assist the President in the role of chair in the conduct of the
18		meetin	g. The chair can and should consult with the Parliamentarian when not certain on how to
19		rule on	a question or proceeding in the circumstances.
20		Additio	onally, the Parliamentarian will have the following duties:
21		a)	Prior to the election, the Parliamentarian will clearly explain the rank choice voting
22			system.
23		b)	The Parliamentarian will address any issues in votes and upon completion certify the
24			vote as in compliance with all the rules of the Senate.
25		c)	As needed, advise the Senate on proper procedure and make recommendations to the
26			By-Laws Committee about necessary changes to be compliant with standing rules of
27			order.
28		d)	Parliamentarian will assist the Senate President and body in drafting an interpretation of
29			by-laws and rules of order and the planning and conduct of meetings.
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1	C.	Co	mmittee	es ·
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3		1)	Role ar	nd Function of Committees
4			a)	All Standing Committees shall take items on referral from the Senate and shall make
5				recommendations to the Senate, in the interest of shared governance.
6			b)	The role of these committees is to provide the faculty perspective to administration and
7				others on matters directly related to the committee's charge. The charges listed below
8				are examples; the Senate President and Steering Committee may request other items.
9			c)	The Faculty Senate may establish Standing Committees beyond those specified herein
10				and may participate with the Administration and other campus governance bodies in
11				establishing joint committees.
12		2)	Commi	ittee Procedures
13			a)	Any member of the faculty may be appointed to these Committees. There may be
14				student representation on University Standing Committees, and the student
15				representatives shall be designated by the appropriate student government
16				organization. The membership on Committees will be chosen to reflect a range and
17				diversity of experience and representation.
18			b)	In the event a member of an elected committee must vacate their seat between May 1
19				and November 30, a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be
20				held in December, and when they must vacate their seat between December 1 and April
21				30 a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held concurrent
22				with the next regular election.
23			c)	Unless otherwise specified, the Senate President will appoint the faculty members of
24				each Senate ad-hoc and Standing Committee.
25			d)	Unless defined otherwise, each Committee will contain at least one (1) Faculty member
26				from each of the Colleges (Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Nursing and Health Sciences,
27				Business, and Visual and Performing Arts), but no College shall have a majority of voting
28				faculty members.
29			e)	Each Committee will establish its rules of procedure and elect its own officers.
30			f)	Each Committee will elect a Secretary whose duties will be:

To prepare minutes of each meeting of the Committee.

To record attendance at each meeting of the Committee.

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1		iii.	To forward copies of the Committee minutes, attendance and
2			recommendations to the Senate President and Secretary for action.
3		iv.	To perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Committee
4			procedures.
5	3) The 9	Standing	Committees of the Faculty Senate
6	ã	a) Admis	ssions Committee
7		i.	The Admissions Committee will review admissions and admissions numbers,
8			financial aid, enrollment management, and admission standards.
9	t	o) By-la	ws Committee
10		i.	The By-laws Committee will conduct an annual review of the Constitution and
11			By-laws and make recommendations as appropriate.
12	C	c) Gradu	nate Council
13		i.	The Council comprises the Graduate Program Directors, the Chair of the School
14			of Law's Academic Council (or designee), the designees of graduate programs
15			where there is no Director (chosen by the Department offering the program),
16			and two (2) graduate students chosen by the Committee. The Council may form
17			ad-hoc subcommittees.
18		ii.	The Council shall review policies and issues regarding new graduate programs
19			and existing graduate programs (including, but not limited to, admission criteria
20			admissions process, graduation process, graduate student funding, and support
21			for faculty mentoring graduate students) and make recommendations to the
22			Associate Provost for Graduate Studies.
23	C	d) Institu	utional Review Board
24		i.	An Institutional Review Board is established for the purpose of protecting the
25			rights of human subjects.
26		ii.	The IRB will operate in a manner consistent with the requirements of federal
27			law and regulations.
28		iii.	It will be composed of nine (9) members as follows: four (4) designated by the
29			Faculty Senate and five (5) designated by the Chancellor. Of these five (5), one
30			must not be affiliated with the University of Massachusetts. There must always
31			be one such member.
32		iv.	Each member is to have a 3-year term which may be renewable.

1		V.	The terms of the nine (9) members are to be staggered so that no more than
2			three (3) terms terminate concurrently.
3	e)	Library	Committee
4		i.	The Library Committee will review library policies that impact academics,
5			including, but not limited to, library hours, significant changes in collections, and
6			access to resources.
7		ii.	The Library Committee will have at least two (2) librarians as voting members.
8	f)	Policy a	and Process Review Committee
9		i.	The Policy and Process Review Committee (PPRC) will accept and review formal
10			proposals from faculty to alter any administrative policy, guideline, procedure,
11			or process.
12		ii.	Formal proposals will include a description of the policy or process along with an
13			argument and/or evidence showing why the policy or process could be
14			improved. The proposal will also include a description of suggested
15			improvements. The PPRC will then solicit input from the department/unit
16			responsible for the policy or process to determine the rationale behind it. If,
17			after reviewing the formal proposal and the administrative response, the PPRC
18			determines the policy or process should be altered, it will make a formal
19			recommendation to the Faculty Senate, which shall take up the
20			recommendation as an action item.
21	g)	Researc	ch Committee
22		i.	The Research Committee will review policies that impact faculty research. They
23			shall receive and review annual reports regarding grant administration and
24			sponsored research, and make recommendations for improving support for
25			research on campus.
26	h)	Campu	s Engagement Committee
27		i.	The Campus Engagement Committee will identify opportunities to enhance
28			campus culture, encourage broad participation in shared governance, and
29			support events and programs that strengthen campus identity. It will serve as a
30			liaison between the Senate and various campus constituencies, ensuring faculty
31			perspectives are well-represented in university-wide initiatives that impact
32			campus life. The committee may also recommend strategies to improve campus

1				culture, engagement, and morale in alignment with the University's mission and
2				values.
3		i)	Studen	t-Faculty Academic Affairs Committee
4			i.	The Student-Faculty Academic Affairs Committee will review academic
5				regulations and policies, including but not limited to those in the catalogue. The
6				committee will make recommendations to the Senate regarding any academic
7				matters that need to be added or amended.
8		j)	Techno	ology Committee
9			i.	The Technology Committee will review faculty technology needs in the areas of
10				instruction and research.
11		k)	Faciliti	es Committee
12			i.	The Facilities Committee will review and, when relevant, make
13				recommendations related to the physical infrastructure and built environment
14				of the University, including, but not necessarily limited to, campus planning,
15				space utilization, maintenance, renovation, and new construction projects. The
16				committee will work in collaboration with university facilities management,
17				administration, and other relevant stakeholders (including graduate students).
18	4)	Curricu	ılum Cor	mmittees
19		a)	Genera	al
20			i.	There will be Curriculum Committees to review and make recommendations
21				regarding all curriculum changes involving courses or programs offered under
22				the auspices of the University if credits earned in those courses or programs can
23				be applied to an academic degree granted through a department or college of
24				the University. The term "curriculum changes" refers to new courses, new
25				programs of courses, discontinuing of existing courses and programs and
26				substantial changes in either title or content of existing courses.
27			ii.	These Committees will include Departmental Curriculum Committees, College
28				Curriculum Committees, a University Curriculum Committee, an Honors
29				Curriculum Committee, and a General Education Committee.
30			iii.	In reviewing and making recommendations regarding curricular matters, each
31				Curriculum Committee may make use of evidence describing student learning
32				that results from student work in a course, seek information regarding the

experience of students within a course or series of courses, and make use of

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2 relevant information regarding student success post-graduation. 3 iv. The Department, College, and University Curriculum Committees will base their 4 review and recommendations on educational standards and the availability and 5 qualifications of faculty members and the budgetary resources as determined 6 by the appropriate Dean. 7 When a Department, Dean, or Curriculum Committee deems that a proposed ٧. 8 curriculum change impinges on its academic area or involves possible allocation 9 of resources, a conference may be requested before the appropriate Curriculum 10 Committee. The appropriate Committee is the College Curriculum Committee 11 for conferences requested by a Department or Dean within the same college; 12 and the University Curriculum Committee for conferences requested on matters pertaining to more than one (1) college. 13 14 vi. Copies of Curriculum Committee recommendations in regard to proposed curriculum changes that involve either graduate level courses or programs will 15 16 be sent by the Curriculum Committee Chairpersons within seven (7) days from 17 the date of the adoption of the recommendation to the Graduate Program Committee for its information. 18 19 A suggested credit course which does not fall within an established department vii. 20 but within the general subject area of a college must be approved by the College 21 Curriculum Committee. If the subject of a suggested credit course is university-22 wide in scope, it must be approved by the University Curriculum Committee. 23 The department(s) closest to the subject area shall be the sponsoring 24 department(s) and will carry out the departmental provisions of this Article. 25 b) Procedures i. 26 Copies of any proposed curriculum changes being considered by any of the 27 Department, College, and University Curriculum Committees will be sent to all 28 Deans and Department Chairs whose academic programs require the affected 29 courses, and to the Department in which the course resides. This information 30 will be given at least seven (7) days in advance of the vote on the proposals. 31 Copies of the recommendations of the Department, College, and University ii. 32 Curriculum Committees will be sent to the Provost, the Faculty Senate President

1		and Secretary, the Dean of Library Services, all Deans and Department
2		Chairpersons whose curricula require the affected courses, and the Department
3		in which the course resides within seven (7) days from the date of their
4		adoption. The Provost's Office shall maintain an indexed and searchable website
5		summarizing curriculum changes and recommendations. The faculty will be
6		notified of updates to this website on a regular basis.
7	iii.	All new course and course change requests received by the Provost's Office will
8		be presented for review for a period of no less than six (6) weeks before
9		approval is granted.
10	iv.	Where significant overlap or duplication of course offerings from different
11		departments is identified, the Provost's Office will refer the matter to the
12		Senate. The Senate will request that the appropriate College Curriculum
13		Committee (when the two departments are in the same College) or the
14		University Curriculum Committee (when the two departments are in different
15		Colleges) serve as a Hearing Committee. The recommendation of the
16		Committee on a resolution of whether the proposed new course significantly
17		duplicates an existing course will be sent to the Provost within thirty (30) days.
18	c) Depart	mental Curriculum Committees
19	i.	Each department will establish a Departmental Curriculum Committee of a size
20		to be determined by vote in each department. Departments with multiple
21		programs, program options or graduate programs may establish such a
22		Committee for each option. Each department shall establish policies that
23		govern its Curriculum Committees. The Committee will elect its own
24		Chairperson, who will be a faculty member.
25	ii.	This Committee will receive input from students on curriculum matters. Student
26		input may include student membership, student surveys or focus groups, or
27		other methods defined by the department policies.
28	iii.	This Committee will make recommendations to the department for curriculum
29		changes within the department, and upon departmental approval, submit them
30		to the Dean of the College or School.
31	iv.	Where a College does not have independent and separate departments, there
32		will be a single College Curriculum Committee. This Committee will make

1			recommendations to the full faculty membership for curriculum changes within
2			the college, and upon college approval, submit them to the Dean of the College. $\label{eq:college} % \begin{center} c$
3		٧.	When the proposed curriculum changes involve another department or college, $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right$
4			the Dean will forward the proposals to either the College or University
5			Curriculum Committee, as appropriate, for its recommendation.
6		vi.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
7			academic year on any and all actions taken.
8	d)	College	Curriculum Committees
9		i.	Each college will establish a College Curriculum Committee. This Committee will
10			consist of at least one (1) Faculty member elected from each department in the
11			college. The Committee will elect its own Chairperson, who will be a faculty
12			member.
13		ii.	Where possible this Committee will have a student majoring in each
14			department in the College serving as non-voting members, except where
15			$required \ by \ external \ accreditation \ agencies, in \ which \ case \ the \ student \ members$
16			will be voting members.
17		iii.	In the School of Law there will be a single Curriculum Committee. This
18			Committee will be composed of three (3) full-time faculty members
19			recommended by the Committee on Committees and confirmed by a vote of
20			the voting faculty members of the School of Law; and two (2) law student
21			members, one each from the day and night/weekend divisions selected by the
22			Student Bar Association.
23		iv.	This Committee will recommend the requirements for earned degrees granted
24			within the college including minimum requirements for majors, minors and
25			special options in a field. Such recommendations will be forwarded to the Dean
26			of the College for action then to the Provost, then to the Chancellor.
27		٧.	This Committee will periodically review and make recommendations regarding
28			college-wide curricular requirements.
29		vi.	This Committee will make its recommendations to the Dean of the College on all
30			proposed curriculum changes that involve two (2) or more departments within
31			the college. The College Curriculum Committee will be the Hearing Committee
32			when there is a disagreement between two departments, one of which requires $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right$

1			a course for its majors in another department and the other of which provides
2			that course. The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the
3			disagreement will be sent to the Dean of the College for action within thirty (30)
4			days. A copy of the recommendation will be sent to the Provost.
5		vii.	This Committee will serve as an Appeals Committee if the recommendations of
6			the Dean of the College and a Departmental Curriculum Committee should
7			differ. The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the
8			disagreement will be sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days.
9		viii.	All motions on curriculum will be passed at one (1) meeting by a vote of the
10			majority of the actual membership of the Committee, or by a simple majority of
11			those attending the meeting at two (2) consecutive meetings for which
12			adequate notice is given for the meeting and of the agenda.
13		ix.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
14			academic year on any and all actions taken.
15	e)	Univer	sity Curriculum Committee
16		i.	This Committee will consist of two (2) Faculty members from each Senate
17			Council elected by the faculty therein, one (1) librarian elected by the Librarians
18			Senate Council and one (1) student elected from a department within each
19			Senate Council serving as non-voting members except where required by
20			external accreditation agencies, in which case the student members will be
21			voting members.
22		ii.	The term of service will be two (2) years with the terms staggered for the two
23			(2) Faculty members elected by the same Senate Council.
24		iii.	This Committee will consider and make recommendations to the Provost for
25			action on all undergraduate degree programs or certificates being proposed by
26			any of the Colleges.
27		iv.	This Committee will consider and make recommendations to the Provost for
28			action on all proposals for the establishment or discontinuance of graduate
29			programs or graduate certificates at the University.
30		V.	This Committee will make recommendations to the Provost for action on all new
31			courses or programs which involve the faculty from two (2) or more Colleges, or
32			courses required for students outside the college in which the course is being

1			offered. The Committee will also make recommendations on new programs,
2			certificates or courses falling outside one of the established Colleges, or where
3			the location of the new course, certificate or program is itself a matter of
4			debate.
5		vi.	This Committee will be the Hearing Committee when there is disagreement
6			between departments of two (2) Colleges, one (1) of which requires a course for
7			its majors in another department and the other which provides that course. The
8			recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the disagreement will be
9			sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days. A copy of the
10			recommendation will be sent to the Chancellor. The recommendation will take
11			effect upon approval by the Chancellor.
12		vii.	This Committee will serve as an Appeals Committee if the recommendations of
13			the Dean of the College and the College Curriculum Committee should differ.
14			The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the disagreement will
15			be sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days. A copy of the
16			recommendation will be sent to the Chancellor. The recommendation will take
17			effect upon approval by the Chancellor.
18		viii.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
19			academic year on any and all actions taken.
20		ix.	This Committee will consist of two (2) Faculty members elected from the
21			departments within each of the Senate Councils that includes a Department
22			with an undergraduate program, elected by the members of that Senate
23			Council.
24	f)	Honors	Curriculum Committee
25		i.	Honors courses shall be defined as those courses offered with the Honors HON
26			designation or with the Honors H suffix. Honors Faculty (those with a formal
27			appointment to the Honors College) and Honors Affiliated Faculty shall be
28			defined by the Honors College by-laws.

The term of service will be two (2) years with the terms staggered for 22 the two (2) Faculty members elected by the same Senate Council. 23 ii. No member of the University Curriculum Committee may serve on the General 24 Education Committee. 25 iii.  - 5) The Senate may invite whomever it desires to attend meetings and address the assembly.
 - 6) Executive Session: Any member can make a motion to move a portion of a regularly scheduled meeting of the Faculty Senate into Executive Session, which would provide an opportunity for the elected membership to meet privately to address sensitive or confidential issues and to foster robust discourse, strengthen trust and communication. Non-members will be asked to leave the meeting during Executive Session.

E. Election Procedures

1) Senate Cohorts

a) Designated seats will be allocated across three cohorts, with the at-large seats also divided up, as follows:

b) Cohort 3 will stand for election in Spring 2018, followed by Cohort 1 in Spring 2019 and Cohort 2 in spring 2020. Each year, one cohort will stand for election, such that each cohort stands for election every three years.

2) Election of Senators

- a) Election will take place in two phases. The first is the election of designated seats. The second is the election of at-large seats.
- b) Designated Seats
 - A call for nominations or self-nominations will go out to faculty within each Senate Council electing a seat. This will be conducted online, with faculty able to choose from a list of Senate Council faculty members.
