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A. Composition of the Senate

- 1) For the purposes of the Faculty Senate, the Faculty is defined as: Full Time Lecturers, Assistant Professors, Associate Professors, Professors, Chancellor Professors, Assistant Librarians, Associate Librarians, Librarians, Clinical Assistant Professors, Clinical Associate Professors, Clinical Professors, and Professional Technicians who are associated with a particular department. Members of the Faculty are eligible to serve on the Senate and its committees and to vote in elections to those positions.
- 2) All Senators will be elected for three-year (3) terms, except when elected to fill unexpired terms.

 The candidates receiving the largest plurality will be elected.
 - 3) In the event that an election does not result in filling the vacancies, the President of the Faculty Senate, with the advice and consent of the Steering Committee, will appoint members from eligible faculty. In the event an incumbent Senator must vacate their seat between May 1 and November 30, a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held in December, and when they must vacate their seat between December 1 and April 30 a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held concurrent with the next regular election.
 - 4) In cases where an individual elected as a Senator or committee member takes a sabbatical leave or other temporary leave, the President of the Senate, with the advice and consent of the Steering Committee, shall appoint an interim member during the time of their leave, and the elected individual will resume that seat upon their return, so long as the date of their return remains within their initial term of office. In cases where an individual elected as a Senate Officer takes a sabbatical leave or other temporary leave, their seat shall be vacated and filled in accordance with the provisions in E.3.k.
 - 5) Members will begin serving their terms at the last regularly scheduled meeting of the academic year of their election.
 - 6) The Senate will consist of eighty-one (81) voting members as follows:
 - a) Twenty-four (24) designated representatives apportioned to Senate Councils as follows:
 - i. Three (3) persons from the Engineering Senate Council—composed of the faculty members in the College of Engineering.
 - ii. Three (3) persons from the Visual and Performing Arts Senate Council –composed of the faculty members in the College of Visual and Performing Arts.

1		iii.	Three (3) persons from the Humanities Senate Council – composed of the
2			faculty members in the Departments of English, Foreign Language & Literature,
3			History, Philosophy and Portuguese.
4		iv.	Three (3) persons from the Social Science Senate Council – composed of the
5			faculty members in the Departments of Crime & Justice Studies, Economics,
6			Political Science, Psychology, Public Policy and Sociology/Anthropology.
7		٧.	Three (3) persons from the Natural Science Senate Council – composed of the
8			faculty members in the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and
9			Medical Laboratory Science.
10		vi.	Two (2) persons from the Business Senate Council – composed of the faculty
11			members in the Charlton College of Business.
12		vii.	Two (2) persons from the Nursing Senate Council – composed of the faculty
13			members in the College of Nursing.
14		viii.	One (1) person from the SMAST Senate Council – composed of the faculty
15			members in the School for Marine Science and Technology.
16		ix.	One (1) person from the Education Senate Council – composed of the faculty
17			members in the School of Education.
18		х.	One (1) person from the Law Senate Council – composed of the faculty
19			members in the School of Law.
20		xi.	One (1) person from the Librarians Senate Council – composed of the librarians.
21		xii.	One (1) person from the Professional Technicians Senate Council – composed of
22			the professional technicians.
23		xiii.	Five (5) persons who are Part Time Lecturers from any Senate Council, no more
24			than three (3) from the same Senate Council. Part Time Lecturers shall be

6				d)	Parliamentarian will assist the Senate President and body in drafting an interpretation of
7					by-laws and rules of order and the planning and conduct of meetings.

10		1)	Rol	e an	d Function of Committees
11				a)	All Standing Committees shall take items on referral from the Senate and shall make
12					recommendations to the Senate, in the interest of shared governance.
13				b)	The role of these committees is to provide the faculty perspective to administration and
14					others on matters directly related to the committee's charge. The charges listed below
15					are examples; the Senate President and Steering Committee may request other items.
16				c)	The Faculty Senate may establish Standing Committees beyond those specified herein
17					and may participate with the Administration and other campus governance bodies in
18					establishing joint committees.
19		2)	Cor	nmi	ttee Procedures
20				a)	Any member of the Faculty may be appointed to these Committees. There may be
21					student representation on University Standing Committees, and the student
22					representatives shall be designated by the appropriate student government
23					organization. The membership on Committees will be chosen to reflect a range and
24					diversity of experience and representation.
25				b)	In the event a member of an elected committee must vacate their seat between May 1
26					and November 30, a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be
27					held in December, and when they must vacate their seat between December 1 and April
28					30 a special election to fill the seat for the remainder of the term will be held concurrent
29					with the next regular election.
30				c)	Unless otherwise specified, the Senate President will appoint the Faculty members of
31					each Senate ad-hoc and Standing Committee.

1	d)	Unless	defined otherwise, each Committee will contain at least one (1) Faculty member
2		from e	each of the Colleges (Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Nursing, Business, and Visual
3		and Pe	erforming Arts), but no College shall have a majority of voting Faculty members.
4	e)	Each C	ommittee will establish its rules of procedure and elect its own officers.
5	f)	Each C	committee will elect a Secretary whose duties will be:
6		i.	To prepare minutes of each meeting of the Committee.
7		ii.	To record attendance at each meeting of the Committee.
8		iii.	To forward copies of the Committee minutes, attendance and
9			recommendations to the Senate President and Secretary for action.
10		iv.	To perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Committee
11			procedures.

13	a)	Admis	sions Committee
14		i.	The Admissions Committee will review admissions and admissions numbers,
15			financial aid, enrollment management, and admission standards.
16	b)	By-lav	vs Committee
17		i.	The By-laws Committee will conduct an annual review of the Constitution and
18			By-laws and make recommendations as appropriate.
19	c)	Gradu	ate Council
20		i.	The Council comprises the Graduate Program Directors, the Chair of the School
21			of Law's Academic Council (or designee), the designees of graduate programs
22			where there is no Director (chosen by the Department offering the program),
23			and two (2) graduate students chosen by the Committee. The Council may form
24			ad-hoc subcommittees.
25		ii.	The Council shall review policies and issues regarding new graduate programs
26			and existing graduate programs (including, but not limited to, admission criteria,
27			admissions process, graduation process, graduate student funding, and support
28			for faculty mentoring graduate students) and make recommendations to the
29			Associate Provost for Graduate Studies.
30	d)	Institu	tional Review Board
31		i.	An Institutional Review Board is established for the purpose of protecting the
32			rights of human subjects.

1		ii.	The IRB will operate in a manner consistent with the requirements of federal
2			law and regulations.
3		iii.	It will be composed of nine (9) members as follows: four (4) designated by the
4			Faculty Senate and five (5) designated by the Chancellor. Of these five (5), one
5			must not be affiliated with the University of Massachusetts. There must always
6			be one such member.
7		iv.	Each member is to have a 3-year term which may be renewable.
8		٧.	The terms of the nine (9) members are to be staggered so that no more than
9			three (3) terms terminate concurrently.
10	e)	Library	Committee
11		i.	The Library Committee will review library policies that impact academics,
12			including, but not limited to, library hours, significant changes in collections, and
13			access to resources.
14		ii.	The Library Committee will have at least two (2) librarians as voting members.
15	f)	Policy	and Process Review Committee
16		i.	The Policy and Process Review Committee (PPRC) will accept and review formal
17			proposals from Faculty to alter any administrative policy, guideline, procedure,
18			or process.
19		ii.	Formal proposals will include a description of the policy or process along with an
20			argument and/or evidence showing why the policy or process could be
21			improved. The proposal will also include a description of suggested
22			improvements. The PPRC will then solicit input from the department/unit
23			responsible for the policy or process to determine the rationale behind it. If,
24			after reviewing the formal proposal and the administrative response, the PPRC
25			determines the policy or process should be altered, it will make a formal
26			recommendation to the Faculty Senate, which shall take up the
27			recommendation as an action item.
28	g)	Resear	rch Committee
29		i.	The Research Committee will review policies that impact Faculty research. They
30			shall receive and review annual reports regarding grant administration and
31			sponsored research, and make recommendations for improving support for
32			research on campus

1	h)	Studen	t Activities Committee
2		i.	The Student Activities Committee coordinates with student groups to organize
3			and/or co-sponsor activities that bring together the campus community, enrich
4			the academic environment, and encourage Faculty, staff and student
5			participation.
6	i)	Studen	t-Faculty Academic Affairs Committee
7		i.	The Student-Faculty Academic Affairs Committee will review academic
8			regulations and policies, including but not limited to those in the catalogue. The
9			committee will make recommendations to the Senate regarding any academic
10			matters that need to be added or amended.
11	j)	Techno	ology Committee
12		i.	The Technology Committee will review Faculty technology needs in the areas of
13			instruction and research.
14	4) Currico	ulum Cor	nmittees
15	a)	Genera	al Company
16		i.	There will be Curriculum Committees to review and make recommendations
17			regarding all curriculum changes involving courses or programs offered under
18			the auspices of the University if credits earned in those courses or programs can
19			be applied to an academic degree granted through a department or college of
20			the University. The term "curriculum changes" refers to new courses, new
21			programs of courses, discontinuing of existing courses and programs and
22			substantial changes in either title or content of existing courses.
23		ii.	These Committees will include Departmental Curriculum Committees, College
24			Curriculum Committees, a University Curriculum Committee, an Honors
25			Curriculum Committee, and a General Education Committee.
26		iii.	In reviewing and making recommendations regarding curricular matters, each
27			Curriculum Committee may make use of evidence describing student learning
28			that results from student work in a course, seek information regarding the
29			experience of students within a course or series of courses, and make use of
30			relevant information regarding student success post-graduation.
31		iv.	The Department, College, and University Curriculum Committees will base their
32			review and recommendations on educational standards and the availability and

- qualifications of Faculty members and the budgetary resources as determined by the appropriate Dean.v. When a Department, Dean, or Curriculum Committee deems that a proposed
 - when a Department, Dean, or Curriculum Committee deems that a proposed curriculum change impinges on its academic area or involves possible allocation of resources, a conference may be requested before the appropriate Curriculum Committee. The appropriate Committee is the College Curriculum Committee for conferences requested by a Department or Dean within the same college; and the University Curriculum Committee for conferences requested on matters pertaining to more than one (1) college.
 - vi. Copies of Curriculum Committee recommendations in regard to proposed curriculum changes that involve either graduate level courses or programs will be sent by the Curriculum Committee Chairpersons within seven (7) days from the date of the adoption of the recommendation to the Graduate Program Committee for its information.
 - vii. A suggested credit course which does not fall within an established department but within the general subject area of a college must be approved by the College Curriculum Committee. If the subject of a suggested credit course is university-wide in scope, it must be approved by the University Curriculum Committee.

 The department(s) closest to the subject area shall be the sponsoring department(s) and will carry out the departmental provisions of this Article.

b) Procedures

- i. Copies of any proposed curriculum changes being considered by any of the Department, College, and University Curriculum Committees will be sent to all Deans and Department Chairs whose academic programs require the affected courses, and to the Department in which the course resides. This information will be given at least seven (7) days in advance of the vote on the proposals.
- ii. Copies of the recommendations of the Department, College, and University
 Curriculum Committees will be sent to the Provost, the Faculty Senate President
 and Secretary, the Dean of Library Services, all Deans and Department
 Chairpersons whose curricula require the affected courses, and the Department
 in which the course resides within seven (7) days from the date of their
 adoption. The Provost's Office shall maintain an indexed and searchable website

1			summarizing curriculum changes and recommendations. The Faculty will be
2			notified of updates to this website on a regular basis.
3		iii.	All new course and course change requests received by the Provost's Office will
4			be presented for review for a period of no less than six (6) weeks before
5			approval is granted.
6		iv.	Where significant overlap or duplication of course offerings from different
7			departments is identified, the Provost's Office will refer the matter to the
8			Senate. The Senate will request that the appropriate College Curriculum
9			Committee (when the two departments are in the same College) or the
10			University Curriculum Committee (when the two departments are in different
11			Colleges) serve as a Hearing Committee. The recommendation of the
12			Committee on a resolution of whether the proposed new course significantly
13			duplicates an existing course will be sent to the Provost within thirty (30) days.
14	c)	Departi	mental Curriculum Committees
15		i.	Each department will establish a Departmental Curriculum Committee of a size
16			to be determined by vote in each department. Departments with multiple
17			programs, program options or graduate programs may establish such a
18			Committee for each option. Each department shall establish policies that
19			govern its Curriculum Committees. The Committee will elect its own
20			Chairperson, who will be a Faculty member.
21		ii.	This Committee will receive input from students on curriculum matters. Student
22			input may include student membership, student surveys or focus groups, or
23			other methods defined by the department policies.
24		iii.	This Committee will make recommendations to the department for curriculum
25			changes within the department, and upon departmental approval, submit them
26			to the Dean of the College or School.
27		iv.	Where a College does not have independent and separate departments, there
28			will be a single College Curriculum Committee. This Committee will make
29			recommendations to the full Faculty membership for curriculum changes within
30			the college, and upon college approval, submit them to the Dean of the College.

1	v.	When the proposed curriculum changes involve another department or college,
2		the Dean will forward the proposals to either the College or University
3		Curriculum Committee, as appropriate, for its recommendation.
4	vi.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
5		academic year on any and all actions taken.
6	d) College	· Curriculum Committees
7	i.	Each college will establish a College Curriculum Committee. This Committee will
8		consist of at least one (1) Faculty member elected from each department in the
9		college. The Committee will elect its own Chairperson, who will be a Faculty
10		member.
11	ii.	Where possible this Committee will have a student majoring in each
12		department in the College serving as non-voting members, except where
13		required by external accreditation agencies, in which case the student members
14		will be voting members.
15	iii.	In the School of Law there will be a single Curriculum Committee. This
16		Committee will be composed of three (3) full-time Faculty members
17		recommended by the Committee on Committees and confirmed by a vote of
18		the voting Faculty members of the School of Law; and two (2) law student
19		members, one each from the day and night/weekend divisions selected by the
20		Student Bar Association.
21	iv.	This Committee will recommend the requirements for earned degrees granted
22		within the college including minimum requirements for majors, minors and
23		special options in a field. Such recommendations will be forwarded to the Dean
24		of the College for action then to the Provost, then to the Chancellor.
25	v.	This Committee will periodically review and make recommendations regarding
26		college-wide curricular requirements.
27	vi.	This Committee will make its recommendations to the Dean of the College on all
28		proposed curriculum changes that involve two (2) or more departments within
29		the college. The College Curriculum Committee will be the Hearing Committee
30		when there is a disagreement between two departments, one of which requires
31		a course for its majors in another department and the other of which provides
32		that course. The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the

1			disagreement will be sent to the Dean of the College for action within thirty (30)
2			days. A copy of the recommendation will be sent to the Provost.
3		vii.	This Committee will serve as an Appeals Committee if the recommendations of
4			the Dean of the College and a Departmental Curriculum Committee should
5			differ. The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the
6			disagreement will be sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days.
7		viii.	All motions on curriculum will be passed at one (1) meeting by a vote of the
8			majority of the actual membership of the Committee, or by a simple majority of
9			those attending the meeting at two (2) consecutive meetings for which
10			adequate notice is given for the meeting and of the agenda.
11		ix.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
12			academic year on any and all actions taken.
13	e)	Univers	sity Curriculum Committee
14		i.	This Committee will consist of two (2) Faculty members from each Senate
15			Council elected by the faculty therein, one (1) librarian elected by the Librarians
16			Senate Council and one (1) student elected from a department within each
17			Senate Council serving as non-voting members except where required by
18			external accreditation agencies, in which case the student members will be
19			voting members.
20		ii.	The term of service will be two (2) years with the terms staggered for the two
21			(2) Faculty members elected by the same Senate Council.
22		iii.	This Committee will consider and make recommendations to the Provost for
23			action on all undergraduate degree programs or certificates being proposed by
24			any of the Colleges.
25		iv.	This Committee will consider and make recommendations to the Provost for
26			action on all proposals for the establishment or discontinuance of graduate
27			programs or graduate certificates at the University.
28		٧.	This Committee will make recommendations to the Provost for action on all new
29			courses or programs which involve the Faculty from two (2) or more Colleges, or
30			courses required for students outside the college in which the course is being
31			offered. The Committee will also make recommendations on new programs,
32			certificates or courses falling outside one of the established Colleges, or where

1			the location of the new course, certificate or program is itself a matter of
2			debate.
3		vi.	This Committee will be the Hearing Committee when there is disagreement
4			between departments of two (2) Colleges, one (1) of which requires a course for
5			its majors in another department and the other which provides that course. The
6			recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the disagreement will be
7			sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days. A copy of the
8			recommendation will be sent to the Chancellor. The recommendation will take
9			effect upon approval by the Chancellor.
10		vii.	This Committee will serve as an Appeals Committee if the recommendations of
11			the Dean of the College and the College Curriculum Committee should differ.
12			The recommendation of the Committee on a resolution of the disagreement will
13			be sent to the Provost for action within thirty (30) days. A copy of the
14			recommendation will be sent to the Chancellor. The recommendation will take
15			effect upon approval by the Chancellor.
16		viii.	This Committee will report to the Senate President at least once during each
17			academic year on any and all actions taken.
18		ix.	This Committee will consist of two (2) Faculty members elected from the
19			departments within each of the Senate Councils that includes a Department
20			with an undergraduate program, elected by the members of that Senate
21			Council.
22	f)	Honors	Curriculum Committee
23		i.	Honors courses shall be defined as those courses offered with the Honors HON
24			designation or with the Honors H suffix. Honors Faculty (those with a formal
25			appointment to the Honors College) and Honors Affiliated Faculty shall be
26			defined by the Honors College by-laws.
27		ii.	There shall be an Honors Curriculum Committee. The size of this Committee
28			shall be determined by the Honors Faculty, but in no circumstances shall there
29			be fewer than six (6) faculty members together with the President and Vice
30			President of the Honors Student Council, who shall be voting members. The
31			Associate Director of Honors shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member of

the Committee. The Committee shall elect its own Chairperson, who shall be a 1 2 faculty member. 3 iii. All Honors Faculty shall be eligible to vote in a secret ballot to elect the 4 members of the Honors Curriculum Committee from among the Honors Faculty. 5 Should the number of Honors Faculty elected be fewer than the number of 6 positions to be filled, then there shall be a secret ballot to elect members of the 7 Honors Affiliated Faculty to serve on the Committee. The Honors Curriculum Committee shall review and make recommendations 8 iv. 9 regarding the initial approval of Honors courses and shall conduct periodic 10 review of all Honors courses. The Honors Curriculum Committee shall 11 recommend requirements for meeting the curriculum standards of the 12 Commonwealth Honors Program. Such recommendations shall be forwarded to 13 the Director of the Honors College for action then to the Provost then to the 14 Chancellor. The recommendation shall take effect upon approval by the Chancellor. A copy of the recommendation shall be forwarded to the President 15 16 of the Faculty Senate for informational purposes. 17 g) General Education Committee i. This Committee will consist of two (2) Faculty members from each Senate 18 19 Council offering undergraduate degree programs, elected by the faculty 20 therein. The term of service will be two (2) years with the terms staggered for 21 the two (2) Faculty members elected by the same Senate Council. 22 ii. No member of the University Curriculum Committee may serve on the General 23 Education Committee. 24 iii. No member of a College Curriculum Committee may serve on the General 25 Education Committee. This Committee's recommendations will include the establishment, 26 iv. 27 maintenance and periodic updating of lists of designated courses that satisfy 28 each of the categories of general education requirements. Courses shall be 29 considered by the General Education Committee only upon endorsement by 30 Department Chairs or Program Directors. To be included on a list of courses 31 that satisfy a General Education Requirement, a course must meet the

standards approved by the Faculty Senate for the category. Lists of designated

1					courses will be recommended by the General Education Committee to the

- 4) Any member of the faculty will have the right to attend meetings of the Senate (but without the right to vote or make motions) and to address the Senate on a matter of interest at the appropriate time at any duly constituted meeting when recognized by the presiding officer.
 - 5) The Senate may invite whomever it desires to attend meetings and address the assembly.
 - 6) Executive Session: Any member can make a motion to move a portion of a regularly scheduled meeting of the Faculty Senate into Executive Session, which would provide an opportunity for the elected membership to meet privately to address sensitive or confidential issues and to foster robust discourse, strengthen trust and communication. Non-members will be asked to leave the meeting during Executive Session.

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E. Election Procedures

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1) Senate Cohorts

a) Designated seats will be allocated across three cohorts, with the at-large seats also divided up, as follows:

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b) Cohort 3 will stand for election in Spring 2018, followed by Cohort 1 in Spring 2019 and Cohort 2 in spring 2020. Each year, one cohort will stand for election, such that each cohort stands for election every three years.

2		a)	Election will take place in two phases. The first is the election of designated seats. The

4		b)	Designated Seats
5			i. A call for nominations or self-nominations will go out to faculty within each
6			Senate Council electing a seat. This will be conducted online, with faculty able
7			to choose from a list of Senate Council faculty members.
8			ii. After confirming each nominee's candidacy, elections will take place online with
9			the faculty members of each Senate Council casting one vote for a candidate
10			running for the designated seat. The candidate with the highest plurality of
11			votes wins the seat.
12		c)	At-Large Seats
13			i. After the winners of the designated seats have been determined and
14			announced, a call for nominations or self-nominations will go out to all faculty.
15			Those who ran for designated seats and lost are eligible to run for an at-large
16			seat. Nominations will take place online.
17			ii. After confirming each nominee's candidacy, elections will take place online with
18			each faculty member casting as many votes as there are at-large seats, which in
19			normal circumstances will be seventeen. The candidates with the nine highest
