

Future Plans of Undergraduate Degree Earners: AY 2011-2012




Figure 1. Future Plans of Undergraduate Degree Recipients

In addition to the undergraduate student exit survey that is completed as part of the application for graduation process, students are also asked to complete a brief survey (called the "Cap and Gown Survey") when they line up at the bookstore in May to pick up their caps and gowns for the May graduation ceremony. A key question on the survey asks students, "What is MOST LIKELY to be your main activity or activities upon graduation?" ¹ Students are presented with a list of possible activities and they may select all that apply to their situation. This question on the survey was completed by 819 of the 1,251 undergraduates who earned a degree in academic year 2011-2012 (i.e., a 65.5% response rate). Figure 1 shows the percentage of students that indicated each activity as a main activity upon graduation.

Note: Percentages do not add up to 100% because respondents could select more than one activity. The employment and graduate study categories are based on responses to questions that originally asked about part-time and full-time status in these categories; percentages may reflect students who indicated both part-time and full-time status.

Because the Cap and Gown Survey is administered prior to graduation, it is important to note that responses do not precisely reflect eventual outcomes.
