RESEARCH INTERESTS

To make sense of their emotional world, human beings divide emotions into categories (e.g., happiness and fear)—these categories represent how we "see" and conceptualize emotions. I am interested in how these categories first emerge, how they develop with age, and how culture and language interact with this development. What is universal and what is culture-specific in the way we navigate our emotional world?

This program of basic research demonstrated that children begin with two broad and valence-based categories (feels good vs. feels bad) which only gradually differentiate as children acquire adult-like emotion concepts. How differentiated these categories are — or how differentiated they become — varies with culture and, if you are bilingual, with language. My cross-cultural work has challenged dominant theories of emotion and shed some light on how we understand various cues to emotion, including facial expressions, situational causes, and behavioral consequences.

More recently, I have extended my emotion research to other domains, including fiction (i.e., what role emotion plays in children's understanding of the structure of fiction) and morality (i.e., the nature of the cognitive association between disgust and our judgments of moral violations).
