#### Distance Education Limits:

Students may not earn more than 10 credits in distance education courses during their first 30 credits of J.D. study. Students may earn no more than 30 credits in distance education courses during their entire J.D. program. ***During summer 2026, Law 558, Law 710 and 742 count as distance education courses.***

#### Summer Registration Requirements:

- No student may take more than six credit hours during the summer session without prior written approval of the Associate Dean. No student may take more than nine credit hours during the summer session under any circumstances. (Student Handbook § 8)
- Students who have not completed a year of full-time study or its equivalent (24 credits) may enroll only in those summer classes that are designated [1L] as being open to them.

**ExamSoft:** Laptop users must report to the exam room **15 minutes before the scheduled time of the exam** in order to perform the required set up. Software must be opened within 10 minutes prior to the start of the exam. If the software cannot be opened at least 10 minutes before the start of the exam, the student must hand-write the exam. The starting time of the exam will not be delayed, nor will the ending time be extended. All exam writers (laptop and paper) will be writing in the same exam room. Ear plugs are available upon request.

**Examination Conflicts:** A student who has an "examination conflict," as defined in the *UMass Law Student Handbook* § 16(d) (iii), is entitled to have one of the examinations rescheduled. There is an examination conflict when a student has two or more final examinations scheduled to start fewer than sixteen hours apart. For example, if you have exams scheduled at 6:30 p.m. on Monday and 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, you have an examination conflict. If you have exams scheduled at 1:30 p.m. on Monday and 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, you do not have an examination conflict. If you have an examination conflict, you must **submit a petition within two weeks of the close of the published add and drop period**. If you do not file a timely petition, you will be deemed to have waived your right to object to the conflict.
