## Professor Katie Krafft, Crime and Justice Studies, with Caroline De Souza '23



## Women's History Month Faculty Speaker Series 2024

In recognition of Women's History Month, the Center for Women, Gender and Sexuality and the Department of Women's and Gender Studies have co-organized the

2024 Women's History Month Faculty Speaker Series. All the talks were held in CWGS (Campus Center, Room 207).



### **Dr. Kristin McHenry "The Price of Water: Gendered Analysis of Water Contamination Related to Fracking"**

This research project analyzes Pennsylvania's everyday lived experiences at the frontline of the fossil fuel industry, using critical energy justice and feminist frameworks. It specifically asks: what is the relationship between fracking, water, and gender? This article emerged from a longer study on fracking in Pennsylvania, where a long history of coal industry extraction has informed some communities' present-day opposition to fracking (Poole and Hudgins 2014). That study, which focused more on the environmental health impact of fracking

on women, was based primarily on qualitative interview data gathered from adult women living in areas of Pennsylvania where fracking had occurred or was ongoing (McHenry 2017). The results suggest that communities are socially impacted and women's lives specifically are altered in inequitable ways by water contamination resulting from fracking. The

Marcellus Shale in Pennsylvania has allowed the U.S. to be less reliant on non-domestic energy sources and to export energy, while promoting job and economic growth. However, those who live in Pennsylvania near fracking sites experience health and social disparities related to contaminated water. Fracking raises several concerns specific to water, including the sheer volume used in the process and the toxic chemicals that lead to negative health outcomes. The results show there

is inadequate oversight and regulation of fracking practices as it pertains to water management, which contributes to the risk. Water scarcity and contamination significantly impact women's labor and increase their exposure to pollutants due to traditional gender expectations that women's work or responsibilities usually include laundry, cooking, and cleaning, all of which use water and involve exposure to contaminants. This talk uses the concept of petro patriarchy to explore the gendered dimensions of water politics.

## **Dr. Katie Krafft "Feminist Translation Studies and Transnational Solidarities"**




Transnational feminist solidarities rely on communication across borders on multiple levels – linguistic, cultural, social, political, and historical. In this lunchtime talk, Dr. Katie Krafft discussed the field of Feminist Translation Studies and its applications for both deconstructing and resisting the growth of the global far right, as well as what we can learn from Feminist Translation studies about obstacles and opportunities in even the most local coalition-building practices.

## **Dr. Caroline Gelmi "Sappho, Parody, Politics"**

This talk explored the uses of the ancient Greek poet Sappho in late eighteenth- and early nineteenth-century U.S. political life. It discussed how parodies of fragment 31, Sappho's most famous poetic fragment, were published and republished, framed and reframed, in early national newspapers as part of a wider debate on the role of Englishness in American politics. The talk focused on how gender and sexuality played a major role in the reception and uses of Sappho and fragment 31 in these political contexts. In addition to teaching

students a bit about the history of American verse culture, this talk also helped them to think about how a now iconic figure of feminist and queer life has transformed over time.

# “Where the F\*#k are the Women? Representation Matters!”



The panel “Where the F\*#k are the Women? Representation Matters!” was co-organized by **Dr. Juli Parker**, director of the Center for Women’s and Gender Studies, and **Dr. Anupama Arora**, from the departments of English and Communication and Women’s and Gender Studies, as part of collaborative programming for the Women’s History Month, March 2024. In addition to Drs. Arora and Parker, other panelists on this March 4 event included **Dr. Katie DeLuca** (English and Communication) and WGS major **Daizha Reed**. Each panelist applied the “Bechdel test” to films nominated in the “Best Picture” category for the 96th Academy Awards. The Bechdel test, created in

1985 by the graphic novelist Alison Bechdel, asks three questions of a film: Does it contain two or more named female characters? Do they talk to each other? And, if so, do they discuss something other than a man? The panelists used this test as a starting point to reflect on women’s relevance to a film’s story, and whether women had any meaningful presence in a film. In addition to discussing if the Oscar nominated films passed or failed the Bechdel test, the panelists also offered reflections on how the films fared on other tests such as the “Du Vernay test” that gauges racial diversity in Hollywood; and the “Vito-Russo test” which examines how LGBTQ+ characters are included within a film.


