Women's Rights as Human Rights: Global Women's Rights Symposium

This spring the Policy Studies and Women's Studies programs have collaborated to exhibit the value of interdisciplinary work through the Global Women's Rights Symposium. The event is an opportunity "to bring the academic community as well as the general public to the symposium so that we can showcase some of the best research being done on women's rights and so we can also raise a level of awareness among individuals of the importance of focusing on women's rights," states Policy Studies Lecturer Shawna Sweeney.

The Global Women's Rights Symposium will be featuring women who are essential in the movement towards women's equality on a global level. Presenters include:

Jennifer Jackman, who is currently lecturing at Westfield State College, and the former director of Policy and Research of the Feminist Majority

Foundation (FMF), led the organization's campaign to stop gender apartheid in Afghanistan.

Pippa Norris is the McGuire Lecturer of Comparative Politics at Harvard. Norris has co-authored over thirty-six books and is an expert on the influence of Islam on women and cross-national patterns in women's political participation in national legislatures.

Shawna Sweeney is a new lecturer in Policy Studies this year at UMass and is a globalization scholar. Sweeney specializes in international human rights and comparative politics. For her dissertation, Sweeney conducted a cross-national examination of the economic, social, and political rights of women in over 161 countries, as well as the factors that limit women's rights.

Janet Walsh is the acting executive of the Women's Rights Division of the Human Rights Watch (HRW). Walsh's case-

based research has involved women's property and inheritance rights in African countries. This property research has been linked to domestic violence and HIV and AIDS.

This line-up of pioneering global women's rights activists and researchers will offer a balanced perspective to the symposium. As important as it is to highlight the barriers that women face in order to break them, it is equally as important to point out the progress that has taken place for women on a global scale. Sweeney explains that the Global Women's Rights Symposium will demonstrate that "when women and girls are given the same level of rights that they deserve in society, they contribute immensely to social progress, and that's why it's [the symposium] really important".

The symposium will take place Friday, April 7th in Woodland Commons from 1:00 – 4:00 PM and will be followed by a reception.

WMS Affiliate Spotlights

Shari Evans

Shari Evans is an Assistant Professor in the English Department. Her concentration is in African-American and multi-cultural American literature. Prior to coming to UMass Dartmouth, Professor Evans earned her Ph.D. and M.A. from the University of New Mexico. She is greatly interested in comparative ethnic literatures with a special focus on Native American and African American writers, as well as race and gender studies, and literary theory.

Currently Evans is preparing a paper to be presented at the NEMLA entitled, "'Endless Work' and Wide Open Spaces: The Ethics of Home in Toni Morrison's Paradise". She has received a number of awards, including the University of New Mexico Gunter Starkey Award for Teaching Excellence. As a Women's Studies affiliate, Evans would like to teach a major authors course on Toni Morrison, as well as develop courses in multi-cultural women writers, African American women writers, and African Diaspora women writers.

Suzanne Joseph

Assistant Professor of Anthropology and WMS affiliate, Suzanne Joseph, is a second generation Lebanese American. Her bi-cultural upbringing as a Lebanese American, in West Virginia and Florida, allowed for Joseph to maintain a close relationship with her family through frequent visits to Lebanon. Joseph received her B.A. in Anthropology from the University of Central Florida and went on to receive her Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of Georgia.

Joseph specializes in demography, reproduction, human-environment interactions, and the biological and cultural determinants of gender-related behavior. Currently, Joseph is working on a book about marriage and reproduction of Bedouin communities in the Bekaa Valley of Lebanon and explains, "I am excited to be an affiliate of Women's Studies since so much of my research focuses on issues of reproduction, marriage, and social class in a cross-cultural perspective."

Bridget Teboh

Bridget Teboh joins UMass this year as an Assistant Professor of African History. From the Republic of Cameroon, West Africa, Teboh specializes in African History, African –American History, Women's and Gender Studies, and historical ethnography. Teboh began her multi-cultural studies at the University of Cameroon, Yaounde where she received her B.A. (Hons.) in Languages (Bilingual Degree). She then went on to receive her DUEF (Diplôme d'Université d'Études Français) from Université Jean-Moulin, Lyon III, France, and both her M.A. in African Area Studies and her Ph.D. in African History from UCLA.

Teboh has experience in teaching, research, translation, and working with women's grassroots groups in Africa. Currently, she is focusing on research that includes women and gender relations in Cameroon and West Africa, colonialism and post-coloniality which is why "becoming an affiliate WMS at UMass is an honor and the most logical thing to do given her research and areas of specialization."

WMS Course Snapshots For Fall 2006

WMS 200: Introduction to Feminist Theory

For the Fall 2006 semester, Juli Parker will be teaching Introduction to Feminist Theory which will become part of our core curriculum for the Women's Studies Program. This class will be an overview of the many branches of feminist theory, including Liberal, Radical, Cultural, Marxist/Socialist, and Womanist feminism. Readings in this course will exemplify each theory and explain how the ideology can be applied to women's lives and institutions. Professor Parker also teaches a course called Mothers & Daughters. The class is broken up into themes: the institution of motherhood, racial identity and culture, defining mother, adoption and identity, reproductive rights, daughterless mothers, & motherless daughters. While Professor Parker is not a mother, she believes that motherhood is an undervalued identity in our society and is one that is often pushed upon women of all races and classes.

WMS 307: Ecofeminism

Ecofeminism is an intriguing new course being offered by WMS. The ecofeminist view explores the connection between the oppression of women and the oppression of nature. Team-taught by Philosophy professor Cathy Gardner and English professor Jen Riley, Ecofeminism allows for different feminist perspectives to be discovered through the lens of different disciplines. Through occasional opposing positions, Gardner and Riley demonstrate how all forms of oppression intersect by illustrating how their differences are essentially connected. Ecofeminism is a course in which perspectives are constantly shifting, and Professor Gardner explains that "the best way of understanding it is to experience it yourself."

WMS/ENL 370: Women, Writing, and Media

Catherine Houser of the English Department will be teaching Women, Writing, and Media for the Fall 2006 semester. The course will focus on the topics of gender, gendered language, and how women are portrayed in the media. Professor Houser would like for this course to include collaboration with our own campus radio station, WSMU. She hopes for students in the class to write 2-3 minute radio essays on hot topic issues in the media as part of one of their projects. If Professor Houser is able to link up with the radio station, she would also push for students to write one minute essays for Women's History Month that would air throughout the month of March. She is also considering pod-casting these radio essays. The usage of the university's radio station and possibility of pod-casting, as Professor Houser remarks, will depend mostly on grant funding.

CAREER GEAR: Aiding Women in Transition

Career Gear seeks to improve the lives of women in transition and women in low-income situations by providing women with work-appropriate clothing. The organization works closely with other helpful programs in the community that will assist women in searching for jobs as well as aid women in acquiring necessary work skills. Career Gear is a non-profit group that is sponsored by the New Bedford Women's Fund. Partner groups to the Southeastern Massachusetts Women's Fund work to provide job training, free hair cuts and manicures, and interview tips for women seeking to enter the work force. The Women's Fund relies on financial contributions and volunteer services to aid clients in empowering themselves.

What is Women's Studies?

The field of Women's Studies is interdisciplinary. Calling upon such fields as history, economics, psychology, health, music, literature, and visual arts, Women's Studies seeks to understand the position of women in society. The interdisciplinary nature of Women's Studies fosters an active examination of the varying influences upon women's and men's lives such as race, class, ethnicity, gender, sex, sexuality, and age. The University of Massachusetts Dartmouth Women's Studies program provides students an opportunity to think about the construction and influences of gender in contemporary society, to discover the historical factors that have shaped the current status of women from varying backgrounds and countries, and to explore paths to achieve equality for all people.

The WMS Director's Report

Hello Spring 2006! It's hard to believe that in the four years since I joined UMass Dartmouth that the Women's Studies Program has grown as much as it has. We continue to develop our minor program. The WMS program also continues to gain enrollments as we reach out to students via the online minor offered through Professional and Continuing Education.

Even better, we're seeing a growth in student interest in experiential learning, internships, and student organizations. have three new WMS affiliates joining the program (Shari Evans; Susanne Joseph; Bridget Teboh). We also have great Summer and Fall 2006 course offerings that demonstrate the expanding WMS curriculum.

As a result of these developments, and many more that I don't have space to mention here, I'm pleased to report that the state of Women's Studies at UMass Dartmouth is strong. As always, WMS appreciates your ongoing support!
